Who is VOICE?



VOICE teaches people of all races, faiths and backgrounds how to fight and win on issues they care about.

VOICE (Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement) is a nonpartisan citizens' organization of almost 50 faith and civic institutions in Northern Virginia. We organize to build power and do justice in middle and low-income communities in Fairfax, Prince William, Arlington and Alexandria City. Uniting people across lines of race, class, religion, political party and geography, we take action on key issues in our communities including, but not limited to, immigrant rights, foreclosure accountability, affordable housing preservation/ development, and youth investment.

Founded in 2008, VOICE is an independent and nonpartisan organization led by a strategy team of religious, lay, and community leaders from across Northern Virginia. VOICE is funded by dues-paying member institutions (congregations, temples, mosques, union locals, business groups, schools, health centers, etc.), grants from foundations, and generous donations from individuals and businesses.

In the last five years, VOICE has organized and trained thousands of ordinary citizens. These VOICE leaders have won major victories. Together we addressed housing code violations at low-income apartment complexes, protected tenants from being displaced by upscale development, secured funding to provide dental services to thousands of low-income adults, provided expanded recreation services for low-income youth, helped immigrants know their rights and held the nation's largest financial institutions accountable for predatory home loans and neighborhood blight.

VISION

We believe that people working together have the power to change their communities and their country for the better.

NEED

Political and corporate leaders often don't embrace change unless they're pressured by the people they serve. And too many people don't realize they have the potential to join forces and create change in their neighborhoods through organizing.

OUR APPROACH

We work with the people who want to transform the world—from what it is to what they believe it should be. We challenge people to imagine the change they can accomplish, connect individuals and organizations to multiply their power, and organize people by the hundreds and thousands to make their voices heard. We set bold goals, we create effective strategies—and we ACT, taking on the powerful interests that stand in the way.



Started rehabilitation on 140 units of affordable housing in Ward 4 of the District of Columbia;

Completed, leased up 100%, 39 units of new construction affordable housing housing in Ward 7 of the District of Columbia;

Won a VISION Award for Historic Preservation of the House of Lebanon project. An Adaptive Reuse of the historic Margaret Murray Washington Vocational High school into affordable senior housing in Ward 5 of the District of Columbia.

VOICE is affiliated with the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF), the nation's first and largest network of multifaith broad-based citizen organizations, which has seven decades of experience winning tough battles on housing, health care, education, living wages, immigrant rights and other issues across the nation.

VOICE works most closely with Metro IAF

affiliates in the East, Midwest, and Southeast. In 2015, Metro IAF organizations had great success!

Metro IAF launched Do Not Stand Idly By Anti-Gun Violence Campaign (DNSIB), to use the purchasing power of local, state and federal government agencies to leverage change in the firearms industry that would save lives by bringing state-of-the-art gun safety technologies to the market. To date, 80 jurisdictions, including Atlanta, Boston, Connecticut, Pittsburgh, Durham have signed on to DNSIB. President Obama has ordered the government to conduct further research into smart gun technology.

WIN Delivers Jobs Agreement; National Model For EPA Waste Water Clean-Ups. Washington Interfaith Network won a MOU agreement between DC Water, DC Mayor Muriel Bowser and US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to invest \$90 million for Green Infrastructure and local hiring of DC residents on its massive \$2 billion EPA-mandated stormwater clean up project.

BUILD Organizes \$10 Million Equity Fund to Transform East Baltimore Blight Into a Thriving Community and to Create Jobs for Local Residents. Baltimoreans United for Leadership Development (BUILD) and TRF Development Partners (TRFDP), an affiliate of The Reinvestment Fund (TRF), created a joint venture to rebuild East Baltimore's Oliver neighborhood.

Common Ground Wins \$30 million Agreement from Hedge Fund-Milwaukee Bucks Owner To Save Homes & To Fix Foreclosed Properties. Common Ground and the City of Milwaukee announced in August 2015 a \$30 million agreement with Wesley Edens and Nationstar to provide principal reduction to homeowners' delinquent on their mortgage loans and to finance the rehabilitation of blighted, foreclosed properties.

Durham CAN in North Carolina Won a Nationally Recognized Police Accountability Agreement Addressing Racially Biased Traffic Stops. As a result of organizing led by African American and Latino residents, police are now required to inform drivers in English & Spanish of their right to decline a vehicle search, and officers must receive written consent from drivers before searching their cars.

Issue Campaigns & Priorities



Issue campaigns are the public expression of our work. Campaigns emerge from a process that begins with conversations with leaders in our institutions and communities. Energized by a desire to improve the community, leaders organize to research the causes and impact of the problem. In time, the cohesive and expanded group knows the background, defines the issue, and takes action.

Summary of 2015 Accomplishments









576 four-year olds can now attend pre-K in Prince William. VOICE moved the School Board to accept \$10 million in federal dollars to expand Pre-K that the Board had planned to reject.

VOICE Arlington was instrumental in ensuring \$12.5 million for affordable housing in 2015 & the passage of the County's Affordable Housing Study that mandates 17% of all Arlington housing be affordable.

240 seniors at Fellowship Square in Reston organized with Fairfax VOICE leaders and won the right to Senior Affordable Housing. In 2015, Fairfax City & County VOICE leaders collectively won 488 units of affordable housing & the first ever Affordable Housing Policy in Fairfax City.

Public housing tenants are organizing with VOICE Alexandria leaders to stop the displacement of long-time African American families from 500+ units in Old Town & near the Braddock Metro that Alexandria seeks to redevelop.

RISK OF DISPLACEMENT OF LONG TIME ALEXANDRIA RESIDENTS: In 2014, the

Alexandria Redevelopment & Housing Authority (ARHA) proposed to redevelop 551 units of public housing in Old Town and near the Braddock Street metro. This proposed redevelopment has to be viewed in light of the City's history of displacement of African-American communities for urban renewal and transportation projects which took land and hundreds of homes owned by long-time African-American residents. The ARHA redevelopment puts at risk more housing for African-American communities than the historic use of eminent domain, and the redevelopments of Cameron Valley, the Berg and Uptown combined.

VOICE WINS ACTION ON MAINTENANCE ISSUES IN PUBLIC HOUSING: Through

community walks & inspections, VOICE & ARHA tenant leaders documented atrocious maintenance issues such as bed bugs, mold, collapsing ceilings, and non working appliances that residents had been trying to get fixed for 6+ months. VOICE-ARHA tenant leaders secured action on these maintenance issues within 24 hours and ARHA CEO Roy Priest pledged to fix future issues identified by VOICE-ARHA tenant leaders within 7-10 days and emergency issues within 24 hours.

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THE COMMUNITY & VOICE ORGANIZE TO SECURE CITY OFFICIALS SUPPORT: VOICE talked with hundreds of ARHA residents and community members and created VOICE-ARHA Tenants redevelopment principles to ensure that the displacement of the past will not be repeated in the future. VOICE & ARHA tenant leaders secured commitments in Fall 2015 meetings and public actions from ARHA CEO Roy Priest, Alexandria Mayoral candidates and City Council candidates to work with VOICE to implement the redevelopment principles, including:

- Tenants and the public are at the table in a meaningful way during the redevelopment & communication is improved;
- Proper maintenance standards are
 implemented before and after redevelopment;
- Jobs for public housing residents and low income Alexandrians at any redevelopments as required by HUD;
- No dispersal 100% of residents able to return to their neighborhoods after any redevelopment;
- Build First/Swing Space Strategy so that no residents have to leave Old Town during the redevelopment;
- Public land is used for public good—
 Redevelopment should increase the number of affordable housing units;
- Historic residents also participate in benefits of progress (ex. youth facilities, professional development, job training, etc.)
- 100% financial transparency so that public knows the financial details of the projects, including developer & ARHA profits.

VOICE WINS BIG ON AFFORDABLE HOUSING:

• VOICE leaders won County Board approval for a new 229-unit Columbia Hills affordable housing complex. • We turned out 40+ leaders to argue, successfully, for no cuts in FY 2016 funding for the Affordable Housing Investment Fund and secured \$12 million dollars. • Over 85+ leaders compelled the County Board to vote affirmatively on the Affordable Housing Master Plan leading to a 5-0 vote in favor of passing the plan that mandates 17% of all Arlington housing be affordable.

VOICE DEVELOPS LOCAL LEADERS TO ACT AND WIN ON ISSUES THEY CARE ABOUT:

• VOICE developed leaders at Arna Valley to organize and win new Sunday service for ART bus route 87 to their neighborhood. • VOICE organized a meeting of 50+ parents, teachers and residents from 4 different schools in South Arlington, which ultimately led to the formation of a new group and future member of VOICE, Mi Voz Cuenta/ My Voice Counts. Their testimony about low-income residents needing housing was crucial in winning the 5-0 vote on the Affordable Housing Master Plan.

VOICE INCREASES TURNOUT IN LOW-VOTING PRECINCTS IN FIRST EVER GET

OUT THE VOTE CAMPAIGN: · VOICE hosted two Candidate Forums for the primary and general elections with 200 and 160 leaders present respectively, introducing the candidates to VOICE and hearing where they stand on our issues. We launched VOICE's first ever Get Out the Vote Campaign aiming to get power and recognition by raising voter turn-out by 5% in low-voting precincts in South Arlington. Over 100 leaders participated and knocked on doors encouraging neighborhood residents to vote so their voices are heard by elected officials. In the two neighborhoods we targeted, we hugely surpassed our goal and increased turnout by 24% & 12% compared to 2011.





The Muslim Association of Virginia is a proud member and supporter of VOICE. 5404 Hoadly Rd, Manassas, VA 20112 www.daralnoor.org Imam Cemal Gumus, of Dar Al Noor Islamic Community Center, states that Islam is a "religion of justice" that encourages believers to care for and love their neighbors.

At a solidarity event in December 2015, Imam Cemal Gumus said to an interfaith crowd of 130 people: "Please do not be scared of the Muslims and we will not be scared of you. We love you, and we want you to love us, too."

"We love you, too," replied Fr. Gerry Creedon of Holy Family Catholic Church. "There are those who would want us to be scared of our neighbors, especially if they're a different religion or if they're Muslim or a refugee. We're a nation built by immigrants and refugees and we honor the religious beliefs of all who come here."

VOICE WON 264 UNITS OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN FAIRFAX CITY AND

COUNTY: • VOICE leaders and seniors at Fellowship Square won 240 senior units of Affordable Housing in Reston. · Residents of Crescent apartments have sought improved traffic safety measures from Virginia Department of Transportation & Fairfax County along North Shore Drive. • 24 new affordable units were added in Fairfax City. • VOICE Fairfax City leaders won set aside of 6% of units in new apartment complexes to be built. • Together we passed the first ever Affordable Housing Policy in Fairfax City! VOICE tenant and congregational leaders organized for 2 years to ensure this monumental victory.

ORGANIZING WITH OUR IMMIGRANT

BROTHERS & SISTERS: • Together we stopped predatory towing of Audubon mobile home owners' cars by the management company of the mobile home park in southern Fairfax County. • 85 Latino members of St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Reston gathered for an immigration informational session. Bilingual leaders conducted listening sessions before the presentation to listen to immigrants' concerns. • Tenants at Crescent Apartments met with a representative from the VA Department of Transportation to address the danger they face crossing heavily traveled North Shore Drive.






BUILDING RELATIONAL POWER WITH SCHOOLS & CONGREGATIONS: VOICE

dedicated time in 2015 to building our Fairfax Regional Teams. • Over 70 Fairfax congregational & school leaders were trained to do relational meetings. • VOICE has planted seeds to increase the number of member institutions in Fairfax. Currently, there are 12 Fairfax clergy who are in some stage of the discernment process to join VOICE.

For me, VOICE means an opportunity to drive innovation to implement fundamental shifts in how we are organizing ourselves in Northern Virginia and around the Commonwealth when it comes to effectively engaging in social justice, community care, and reducing community violence and conflict. VOICE is a shift towards systemic healing and restorative oriented approaches.

The most meaningful VOICE victory for me in 2015 is the successful reversal of an anticipated partisan Prince William County School Board that ultimately moved to a unanimous approval of a \$10 million grant to expand Pre-K education to an additional 576 low-income children over the next 4 years. Education is the new currency of the 21st century and the platform for a foundation in equitable education begins in Pre-K. VOICE was able to bring nearly 100 leaders to compel the the Board to galvanize for the betterment of our children and the greater Prince William community and not either political party.

Joining with VOICE gives my voice more power. Together this interfaith community has made a difference in my town. In May 2013, I stood up at a Fairfax City Council public hearing to oppose the demolition of 110 low-cost apartments. My comments were politely received, but as one lone person, I did not have the power to be heard. VOICE changed that.

After a multi-year effort from VOICE, in September 2015 the Fairfax City Council passed a clear policy supporting affordable housing in new developments. In exchange for city council approvals, new developments are expected to set aside apartments to be rented at below market rates or proffer cash contributions to be used for affordable housing.

I believe my community is better when the people who work here can afford to live here. I am thrilled that my voice, joined with VOICE, convinced the city council to adopt a policy that will build a better, more inclusive community.

VOICE CELEBRATES MAJOR VICTORIES IN BANK AND FORECLOSURE

ACCOUNTABILITY: On May 31, 2015, 150 VOICE leaders gathered with Senator Mark Warner and other officials to announce securing \$3.5 million for the Metro IAF/VOICE Equity Restoration Fund (\$1.5 million from Bank of America; \$1 million from JP Morgan; and \$1 million from GE). VOICE clergy blessed a once abandoned and foreclosed Georgetown South house that was purchased, rehabbed and sold to a first time homeowner using funds VOICE had organized. Prince William area had 27,000 foreclosures, the most in Virginia.



VOICE ORGANIZES SENIORS TO WIN ACTION ON HOUSING AND FIRE CODE VIOLATIONS:

• VOICE trained 15 leaders from 3 member institutions to conduct listening sessions with over 115 seniors at River Run Senior Apartments in Woodbridge. • A team of seniors from River Run and VOICE leaders conducted door knocking of all 300 units to listen to their neighbors' concerns. • Over 40 seniors and VOICE leaders conducted accountability meetings with management. When VOICE began organizing with residents, there were hundreds of building and fire code violations. Due to persistent and consistent organizing, a new management company has been hired and all fire code and building code violations have been abated.

VOICE HOLDS DAPA TRAININGS FOR

200+ IMMIGRANTS: President Obama took Executive Action in November 2014 by announcing Administrative Relief, otherwise known as DAPA/ DACA, that would provide legal status to an estimated 4 million undocumented immigrants. VOICE organized two Immigration Information Sessions in Dale City and Reston, VA attended by 200+ undocumented immigrants eager to apply for DAPA. Prior to the information sessions, VOICE trained over 25 bilingual leaders, who conducted 20 house meetings before the information sessions.

VOICE WINS PRE-K EXPANSION FOR 576 LOW INCOME CHILDREN: VOICE organized parent and community leaders to push the Prince William County School Board to approve unanimously accepting a \$10 million Federal grant to expand Pre-K to an additional 576 low-income children, an action that the Board was going to reject before VOICE's organizing. Now, the pre-k expansion of 8 new preschool classrooms, opened in the fall of 2015, will serve an additional 144 low-income children each year over the next four years.

VOICE Solidarity: March & Coat Drive for Syrian Refugees

Saturday, December 5th, 2015

There were 150 VOICE leaders, 50% Muslim and 50% Christian & Jewish, who marched from First Christian Church to Dar al Hijrah Islamic Center. There was a great spirit of solidarity as we marched and packed blankets and coats to ship to Syrian refugees.

The Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF) believes in standing for the whole—Anglo, Black, Latino, Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Unitarian, etc.—our broad-based organizations bring us together in our common cause for justice. Metro DC IAF affiliates are organizing Solidarity Events in our regions over the next couple of weeks. In early December, two solidarity events were held, one in Howard County (PATH/IAF) & the other in Northern Virginia (VOICE/IAF).

Rev. Rebecca Messman, of Trinity Presbyterian Church, on behalf of VOICE said, "Jesus taught, 'Love your Neighbor as yourself.' It the narrative of our country. Our statue of Liberty says 'Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to be free.' There is no asterisk after Jesus' words that say, 'Except those who speak different languages or have a different skin tones or say different prayers.' There is nothing in parentheses on the Statue of Liberty that says, "except those fleeing persecution."









VOICE Muslim Solidarity Event: Prince William County

Sunday December 13th, 2015

On Sunday December 13th, 2015, 130 people (50% Muslim, 50% Non-Muslim) gathered in solidarity to pray, break bread together and get to know one another. VOICE sent a strong message that we bring together people of different religions, races, political affiliations and incomes to act together for greater justice in the Prince William area. Leaders had the chance to sit down and talk, one-on-one, with someone of a different faith. They shared stories of their families, where they come from and their hopes for their families.

Coverage from InsideNOVA:

The evening prayer was followed by the potluck meal held in the mosque community room. Imam Cemal Gumus, from Dar Al Noor, and Father Gerry Creedon, of Holy Family Catholic Church, spoke about the importance of building ties between communities of faith.

- Gumus stressed that Islam is a "religion of justice" that encourages believers to care for and love their neighbors.
- "Please do not be scared of the Muslims and we will not be scared of you," Gumus said. "We love you, and we want you to love us, too."
- "We love you, too," answered Creedon, when he took the podium. "There are those who would want us to be scared of our neighbors, especially if they're a different religion or if they're Muslim or a refugee. But as someone once said, 'We have nothing to fear but fear itself."
- "We're a nation built by immigrants and refugees and we honor the religious beliefs of all who come here," Creedon added. ... "Particularly at this time of year, we are called to remedy our problems to get rid of the fear, which can be so easily fostered, and build our community."









VOICE is funded by dues from member organizations and donations from individuals, religious institutions, businesses, and foundations. The current \$498,000 annual budget pays four professional organizers who guide and serve the member organizations on making change on community issues that members have identified. The budget also funds the training of over 250 volunteers each year and covers expenses associated with operating several issue campaigns. VOICE does not accept government funds so that it can remain autonomous and politically independent and non-partisan. VOICE is a tax-exempt non-profit organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Code and is a registered charitable organization with the Commonwealth of Virginia. VOICE completes an audit and files IRS Form 990 annually, copies of which may be obtained upon request.

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
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
